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# Helsinki Airport makes accommodations for pod people

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Pods for travelers arrive in Helsinki

Sometimes when you're traveling, it would be nice to get away from the frantic atmosphere of the airport. If you're in Finland's Helsinki Airport, you can get a respite in the 19 GoSleep sleeping pods available at Gates 18 and 38. Each pod is an ergonomic seat that can be turned into a bed enclosed by a cover that shuts out light and noise. There's space underneath to safely store your hand luggage, and there's a power point inside for charging your laptop or phone. The makers of the pods claim air circulation is good enough to keep you from overheating, and the pods are cleaned after each use and get fresh pillow cases. Cost is about \$9.50 per hour. Helsinki is the first European airport to get the pods, which were invented in Finland but debuted in Abu Dhabi and Dubai. Info: [gosleep.fi](http://gosleep.fi)

### Economy trumps space

All of us who fly economy class would love for the airlines to provide wider seats. But to pay a lot extra? Probably not. That's the conclusion of a poll of 8,300 travelers conducted by Airfarewatchdog.com. Forty-one percent said flat-out that they'd like wider seats but wouldn't pay anything extra. Twenty-six percent said they'd be willing to pay \$10 extra, 24 percent said they'd pay up to \$20, and only 9 percent would pay more than \$20. An earlier poll by the website of 1,700 fliers asked which domestic airline has the most comfortable economy class seats. Southwest was the clear winner, with 22 percent picking it. Delta and JetBlue came in second with 19 percent. Alaska was at 11 percent, United at 9 percent, American at 7 percent, US Airways at 5 percent, Frontier and Hawaiian at 4 percent, AirTran and Allegiant at 3 percent, and Spirit was at the bottom at 1 percent.

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
