#### get active in china

SITA World Tours has set new 2015 dates for its jam-packed, 14-day Family Friendly Journey: China tour (June 20/July 11), beginning in Shanghai and includes visits to Mt. Qingcheng, just outside Chengdu, "where families visit with pandas, take walks in the gorgeous Sichuan countryside and go rafting," says Mary Barnett, concierge sales, SITA. "At The Linden Centre near Dali, we stay in a 14-room restored courtyard mansion. We bike through villages, visit local markets and learn handicrafts. Both are pristine areas less visited by tourists, allowing time for families to bond."

Barnett adds that SITA's family tours are designed specifically for multi-generational travel. "The difference lies in the inclusions. Must-see sightseeing is included in each place, however, we've also added activities that appeal to a broad range of ages, and there are alternatives for those who are less active," she says. Also added to the 2015 dates is a stay at Six Senses Qing Cheng, slated to open in February and set in the Qing Cheng Mountains. The resort features 113 suites (including 78 Six Senses Suites), a Six Senses Spa, two pools, a gym, and kids' club. Call for 2015 rates.

#### techie japan

"Japan has been our top-selling country in Asia for the past two years, and as a result we decided to expand our Japan program for 2015 to include a new itinerary created especially for families," says Janice Farnum, operations and product development, Trafalgar.

That itinerary is the 8-day Samurai Discovery tour where families can visit the ruins of Edo Castle; learn about the history of Tokugawa shoguns; take a sushi-making class and a Taiko drumming lesson with a master musician; visit the Edo-Tokyo Museum to see artifacts and architecture of Tokyo's history and culture during the Edo period; and have lunch at a Machiya townhouse (traditional wooden townhouses) where kids can take calligraphy lessons.

Farnum says another reason Trafalgar is offering a family trip to Japan in 2015 is because of the country's video game appeal and technology. To give families a taste of this industry, the tour also offers them the opportunity to visit Sega Joypolis, an indoor amusement park in the center of Tokyo with rides, 3D movies and simulators; the Sony Building where kids can play the latest games to their heart's content; and the Pokemon Centre and Toei Kyoto Studio Park, where kids can dress up as a samurai. Rates start at \$3,575 pp.

#### explore exotic southeast asia
